The Patron Saint Vincent de Paul

24 April 1581 - 27 September 1660

Vincent was born to a peasant family in France. Although he later achieved fame for his dedication to the poor, his early life was spent attempting to escape his humble roots. His family shared his ambition, hoping that a career in the priesthood would better the family fortune. Soon after becoming a priest, Vincent was captured by pirates and sold into slavery. Once free, and after a period of time in Rome, he found himself in Paris. Upon hearing a dying man's confession, Vincent's heart changed, and he chose to spend his life sharing the Good News that God loves us all.

He spent the rest of his life dedicated to serving the poor. He was reknown for his compassion, humility and generosity.

The Society was named after Saint Vincent de Paul

and follows his teachings and compassion for people in need.

Vincent's life is a great reminder that we can all follow in his footsteps of love and service to others.



The Founder Frédéric Ozanam

23 April 1813 - 8 September 1853

In 1833, as a 20 year old student in Paris and a devout Christian, Frédéric was questioned on what he was doing to help the marginalised in society apart from preaching to others. In a discussion one day, Frédéric was asked to say what the Catholic Church was doing for the poor in France. Frédéric was embarrassed. He knew in his heart that the Church was doing very little.

His response was to gather a group of friends to help him deliver fire wood and clothing to people on the streets. He realised that Christianity was about actions, not just words. The small group decided to adopt the name The Society of St Vincent de Paul. One group turned into many throughout France and then the world, becoming what are known as 'Conferences' today.

Conference is a French word reaning "coming together".

A Conference is a group of people who get together on a regular basis to meet and discuss ways to address particular needs in their community.

"I would like to embrace the whole world in a network of charity."
