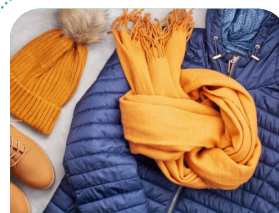

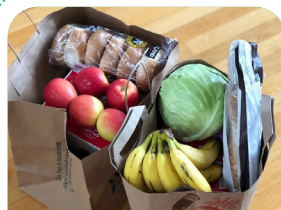

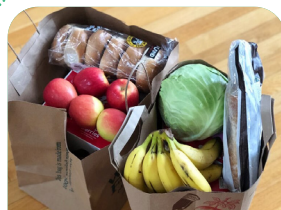

FACTS ON HOMELESSNESS

- Homelessness in New Zealand is caused by a combination of structural factors, like a lack of affordable housing and high costs of living, and individual issues such as poverty, job loss, and poor health
- Rising house prices have increased the rate of homelessness in New Zealand
- House prices have risen faster than wages
- In a OneChoice Kiwi Family survey 8 in 10 worry about house prices while a similar number agree that a dream of owning a home is no longer attainable
- According to the 2023 Census, approximately 112,496 people in New Zealand (2.3% of the population) were severely housing deprived, which includes various forms of homelessness.
